

## LETTER FROM THE CITY MANAGER

# The 1,000-Mile Journey

### The Journey of a 1,000 miles starts with a.....notification from the Minnesota Department of Health?

January of 2015 was a momentous time in New Brighton's history. For the second time in the past 30 years, New Brighton held the federal government accountable in federal court and as a result received additional funding of \$59.4 million. The City's team of staff and consultants who had worked on this project for years leading up to this outcome were proud of the outcome.

Seven days later, the Minnesota Department of Health contacted New Brighton with information that indicated concern about the presence of 1,4-dioxane in the city's water. As I have said publicly over the last three years in presentations at open houses, in my letters sent directly to your home and in the past newsletter articles, this was a hard message to accept.

At the time, I couldn't see the full value of the journey upon which New Brighton was set to embark. Hindsight is 20/20 as the saying goes. I did know we had the "right" team already in place. I know that we had found answers to questions that we as a community had confronted before and I had faith we would find our way again. Having just finished a "journey of a 1,000 miles," if you will, it was hard to take that first step at the beginning of another equally long journey.

As you all know, New Brighton has built an expansion to its water plant that is now operational. You have typically received letters on a quarterly basis to bring the community along on this journey and I want to take a moment to let you know that those letters won't be continued any longer since our plant is operational and we transitioned back to our water supply and system.

Reflecting on the past three plus years, I want to share some other thoughts and observations with the New Brighton community. The team that helped New Brighton from the time we were notified by the Department of Health about 1,4-dioxane is full of too many people to mention. Our litigators at Fredrickson and Byron and our engineers and scientists at Barr Engineering are and have been amazing. I need to shine the light on one city employee specifically though. I ask that you all know and remember the name Scott Boller. Scott is our current Public Works Superintendent and he intends to retire this April.

Originally, Scott wanted to retire three years ago, but then we got the letter from the Minnesota Department of Health and New Brighton needed to start a new journey. The journey was to find a solution to 1,4-dioxane and implement that solution. Part of Scott's duties as Superintendent is to oversee the pumping, treating and distributing of water in New Brighton. Scott has always demonstrated a commitment

to New Brighton and his profession, but everyone in New Brighton should know that Scott chose to postpone his retirement for three years so that he could help New Brighton find a solution to 1,4-dioxane.

In this time, Scott also helped groom other staff and prepare them for working in the newly designed plant. Scott actively participated in helping find his eventual replacement (a gentlemen named Eric Volk who you all will learn about in another article). Scott is now training and grooming Eric to take over the helm as our next Superintendent in the next month or so. New Brighton is a better community because of staff like Scott Boller. Scott was a mentor, a leader, a

cheerleader, a strategist, an amazing human being and frankly, a good friend. Scott will be missed. My final reflection is this: in hindsight, adversity teaches us many things. The journey New Brighton started in early 2015 and the adversity that came with it was successfully confronted or traveled because of people like Scott Boller. The journey was easier because of people like Scott. Please remember the name Scott Boller.

# Theft From Motor Vehicles

One of the most common ways to be victimized is to have your property stolen out of your vehicle, and it can occur anywhere. "This is a crime of opportunity for criminals and can be prevented," said Community Engagement Officer Brad Krebsbach.

And remember if you observe suspicious activity to call 911 immediately. Do the best you

can to obtain as much descriptive information regarding any people and/ or vehicles involved and pass that along to the dispatcher. The New Brighton Department of Public Safety wants you to call so they can respond and investigate. If it turns out to be harmless, that is a good thing. But maybe by placing the call you will be helping to intervene prior to the crime being committed.

## Some tips for preventing your property from being stolen out of your vehicle are:

- Always lock your vehicle, even when parking inside the garage
- Keep garage door openers out of plain sight
- Try to always take valuables with you
- Criminals can be watching you so if you need to hide something in your trunk, glove box or under a seat, do so prior to arriving at your destination
- Never leave keys in your vehicle
- Be aware of surroundings
- Park in well-lit areas



## Homeowners, Seriously Consider Flood Insurance!

Did you know that you do not need to live in a "flood plain" in order to qualify for flood insurance? Over 25% of flood insurance claims occur in areas that are not considered high risk for flooding. Due to excessive rainfall events, residential flooding is occurring

more frequently in areas that are not considered flood plain areas. Ninety-five percent of Minnesotan's qualify for the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), and New Brighton residents are part of that ninety-five percent! You may think that your





## Utility Billing Financial Assistance Available

New Brighton offers limited financial relief to low-income single-family homeowners' water and sewer bill. The policy was created in 2017 to encourage residents to retain home ownership and avoid any delinquencies with their water and sewer bill during periods of diminished personal income.

The financial assistance shall apply to the flat rate amounts of the water and sanitary sewer charges on the homeowner's utility bill. The assistance shall equal 50% of the flat rate amount for each service. The

Utility Financial Assistance does not have a benefit expiration date as long as applicants continue to meet eligibility requirements.

### Eligibility Requirements:

To be eligible for the Utility Financial Assistance, applicants must meet all of the following criteria:

1. Owner and occupant of a single-family home
2. Currently enrolled in one or more of the following Ramsey County-administered financial assistance

programs: SNAP (Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program), MFIP (Minnesota Family Investment Program), General Assistance (GA)

3. At or below 165% of the federal poverty threshold guidelines
4. Provide annual written proof of participation in County-administered financial assistance programs.

# Now is the perfect time to establish our

**T**he City has undertaken an overall Park and Trail System Master Plan study. This study is meant to review the existing parks and trails in New Brighton and work with the community to develop a 20-year vision and strategic implementation plan that addresses current recreational needs and desires of our residents as we move forward and determine methods to implement key improvements. The previous park system plan was prepared in 2006, and due to ongoing changes

in populations and demographics and new recreational trends that didn't exist back in 2006, now is the perfect time to establish our community vision for the next 20 years. The park system plan is meant to compliment the 2040 Comprehensive Plan that was recently completed and will identify goals, methods for reaching those goals, cost estimates, and overall priorities for future endeavors.

"We know our residents take great pride in their community and we want

to be sure we are building off this civic pride as we work to appropriately meet current and future expectations for our park and trail system," said Jennifer Fink, Director of Parks and Recreation.

The City has hired WSB, a planning and design consultant, to help guide this planning process that includes a community engagement plan to help gather input from the community. There are different methods for you to engage with us, including neighborhood

meetings, open house meetings, community events, survey, and even an interactive online city map where you can easily leave comments, ideas and issues you want addressed using your computer, laptop or smart phone. You can find this interactive map at <https://wsb.mysocialpinpoint.com/newbrightonparks> where you can also see other comments that have been made so far.

"Tell us what you value most, what areas or items may need improvement,

safety concerns you may have, trails gaps that need to be filled, and even any 'big' ideas you might have," said Director Fink. Think about active recreation, passive recreation, seasonal uses, history, art, culture, connectivity, diversity, sustainability, natural spaces, and more.

As part of the planning process, the design team also includes HCM Architects who will be conducting assessments of the neighborhood

park buildings, the community center, and golf course clubhouse to determine potential improvements and programming modifications that may arise out of the planning study. The planning schedule includes gathering data and conducting site assessments through early summer, conducting an athletic assessment study, and then developing a draft master plan document for further review by the community before finalizing the plan in the fall of 2019.

## Sidewalks

The City sidewalk system is inspected annually by the Public Works Department. The purpose of the inspection is to locate and correct any hazards or potentially hazardous situations for pedestrians. The City requests your help in keeping branches and shrubs clear of the sidewalks and boulevard areas along your property. ## Street Repairs

Any sites that are marked with a flasher and needs permanent road repair will be worked on in the spring, after road restrictions are removed. This work will generally be completed by June 1.

## Boulevard damage

Any turf damage caused by our snow plows and reported to DCAD will be repaired in the spring using topsoil and seed. Report boulevard damage by contacting the Public Works Maintenance staff at 651-638-2111 or email [kim.otis@newbrightonmn.gov](mailto:kim.otis@newbrightonmn.gov)



## Sweeping

Spring sweeping typically begins in April or as soon as streets are free of snow. The streets are swept from the north to south or south to north, rotating every year. Alleys and City parking lots are swept last. Throughout the season, the City will sweep areas as needed.

## Tree Trimming

The Park Maintenance Worker- Forester and city contractors will be trimming trees throughout the city. This year the city will concentrate its efforts on city alleyways and around the neighborhoods along Rice Creek Road to 14th Street NW.

## Mail box damaged?

Any mail box damage caused by our snow plows actually hitting the mail box will be repaired in the spring. If a mailbox is damaged due to indirect contact, including the force of snow generated by the snow plow equipment, the City will not assume any responsibility. Mail boxes and posts should be sturdy enough to withstand the force of the discharged snow from the plow. 


## Yard projects

The City street right-of-way typically extends to an area ten to fifteen feet beyond the curb. This area is called the boulevard and is intended to provide for snow storage, utilities, sidewalks, and other public uses. Residents are requested NOT to put landscape materials such as; fences, rocks, wood chips, ornamental lighting, posts, retaining walls, decorative type gardens, shrubs, trees, or basketball hoops within the boulevard area. The City urges residents to keep any landscaping behind the boulevard.

## Illicit Discharge Detection

**What is an illicit discharge?**  
An illicit discharge is a discharge to a storm sewer system that is not comprised entirely of stormwater runoff, snow melt, or surface runoff. Illicit discharges contain high levels of pollutants, such as heavy metals, oil, solvents, nutrients, viruses, and bacteria. Examples of illicit discharges include sanitary wastewater, oil, gasoline, laundry wastewater, and pesticides.

**What should you look for?**  
Illicit discharges typically have odd smells, colors, and create visible changes in receiving waters. If the receiving waterbody is experiencing fish kills or a stressed environment, a harmful discharge might be present.

**What should you do about them?**  
Document with pictures and report the incident to the City of New Brighton. Call 911 if immediate attention is necessary.


## I-35W North MnPASS Construction Starts Soon

The I-35W North MnPASS project between Roseville and Lino Lakes includes reconstructing pavement, bridges and ramps and adding new MnPASS lanes on I-35W. Construction will start in the spring of 2019 and it is expected to be completed in fall of 2021. As part of the I-35W North MnPASS project, two noise walls will be

constructed in New Brighton. The trees and brush along the existing MnDOT fence need to be removed prior to this construction. To prevent habitat impacts to bats in the area this work has already begun. Upcoming Closures to allow for reconstruction:

- Reduce NB I35W by one lane in April

- Reduce SB I35W by one lane in late April or early May
- You may have already noticed temporary traffic improvements being placed in your neighborhood. Several of these changes include signals that will help mitigate increased traffic using local roadways. # New Brighton Elementary Redevelopment Update

By the end of March 2019, the City is anticipating that a development application for the New Brighton Elementary site and surrounding lands will be complete and ready for review. At the present time, the developers (Dominium & Pulte) are actively working to prepare all necessary documentation including an Environmental Assessment Worksheet. The City anticipates the development application will seek to construct 204 affordable senior (55+) units, 154 affordable workforce housing units, and 53 market rate

townhomes. The proposed densities would be conforming to the City's new 2040 Comprehensive Plan.

Staff will continually be updating the webpage as new information comes forward. This kit includes information on how to participate in organics recycling, a kitchen caddy to collect your organic waste, and two compostable bags. 
The nearest drop-off site for organic recycling is at the Arden Hills yard waste site located at 3530 Hudson Ave., Arden Hills or the newly opened site in St. Anthony at 3301 Silver Lake Rd. NE. For more information, visit [RamseyRecycles.com/OR](http://RamseyRecycles.com/OR).

New Brighton is also working on a grant with Ramsey County to provide residents with an organics recycling drop off container in the city. The City is hoping to make this available to residents as soon as this summer!



## Response Requested for Meter Exchange Appointments

The City of New Brighton is working with HydroCorp to perform a Water Meter Replacement Program. This program will continue over the next few years. Below is important information for all property owners to note: HydroCorp will notify property owners directly when their neighborhood will undergo installation. The new meters will be installed free of charge. Residents must have shut-off valves on each side of the meter and a code-required grounding wire



before HydroCorp can perform the installation. Failure to prepare the shut-off valves and grounding wire will delay the

installation and require additional appointments.

An image of a grounding wire (aka jumper) is shown to the left. If your home does not have the required items, contact a licensed contractor prior to scheduling an appointment.

It is very important that property owners respond to HydroCorp's requests in a timely manner. Failure to schedule a meter exchange appointment could result in water being shut off or future additional charges.



# Code Enforcement

The main function of a Code Compliance Inspector is to protect quality of life, property values, aesthetics, and safety throughout the city by enforcing the City's regulations. New Brighton follows a "complaint based" model for enforcement meaning that individual citizens identify problems and report to the City for examination. The main reason for using a complaint-based model is cost:

staff resources needed for a proactive inspection model are significantly higher.

If you have a code violation to report, please contact Scott Gigrich, Code Compliance Inspector, at 651-638-2061 or email [scott.gigrich@newbrightonmn.gov](mailto:scott.gigrich@newbrightonmn.gov). Please note that your personal information will be kept confidential, but is needed so we can follow up with you.

After a complaint is received, staff will inspect the property. If a code violation is found, staff will notify the property owner and/or tenants, provide direction on how the violation can be addressed, and provide a reasonable amount of time to correct it. If the violation is not resolved, the city may issue a citation and/or have the issue corrected with all costs eventually assessed back to the parcel's property taxes.

## Most Common Complaint: Garbage/Recycling Bin Placement

City code enforcement officials follow up on many neighborhood concerns, and the most common complaint is garbage/recycling bin placement. Here is some information to help clarify common misconceptions and questions. According to city code, bins can be stored:

- Inside an enclosed building (like

a garage or shed).

- Along the side of the house as long as it's not the street side (bins placed on the side of a house are allowed to be visible from the front).
  - Along the back of the home.
- If the property has unique circumstances, like a single car garage, that creates difficulty in

storing the bins in the approved locations, they can be stored in front of the home but need to be screened from view. To report concerns, please contact Code Compliance Inspector Scott Gigrich at 651-638-2061 or email [scott.gigrich@newbrightonmn.gov](mailto:scott.gigrich@newbrightonmn.gov).
